
PADDLE ANTRIM STRATEGIC PLAN



Paddle Antrim is a 501(c)3 non-profit corporation established in 2014. It is currently governed by a seven-member board of directors. The organization is served by an executive director.

Service Area Description

Paddle Antrim's service area includes the Elk River Chain of Lakes Watershed and adjacent watersheds that impact Antrim County. The Chain of Lakes is the largest sub-basin in the Grand Travers Bay Watershed, accounting for 60% of the surface flow into the bay (The Watershed Center). Adjacent watersheds served by Paddle Antrim include the Lake Charlevoix Watershed in Northeastern Antrim County where the picturesque Jordan River Valley begins and the Upper Manistee River Watershed which begins in Southeastern Antrim County.

The 321,000 acre Elk River Chain of Lakes Watershed begins near East Jordan and empties into East Grand Traverse Bay at Elk Rapids. The winding chain first flows north from Beals Lake to Scotts Lake, through Six-Mile Lake and into Lake St. Clair. Near the Village of Ellsworth, the chain heads south through Ellsworth Lake, Wilson Lake, Ben-way Lake, and Hanley Lake. It then passes by the Village of Central Lake as it continues through Intermediate Lake to the Village of Bellaire. The lakes become larger as the chain continues through Lake Bellaire, Clam Lake, and Torch Lake, the largest lake in the Chain. It then heads to Lake Skegemog and Elk Lake before emptying into the Grand Traverse Bay of Lake Michigan in the Village of Elk Rapids.

Paddle Antrim's mission is to protect our water resources by using paddle sports to connect people to our waterways. Through stewardship, education, improved water trail access, and promotion of our waterways, we will increase water resources protection and enhance the economic vitality the region.
